Tsotsi by Athol Fugard (we used to do it for GCSE literature but can't now as it's South African)

The Dark Room by Rachel Seiffert (three stories in one – each can stand alone; WW2 setting for two)

The Old Man and the Sea by Ernest Hemingway (again brief but memorable)

Notes from A Big Country by Bill Bryson (non-fiction essays with a comic edge)

Born a Crime by Trevor Noah (adapted for young readers version available)

Half of a Yellow Sun by Chimamanda Ngozi Adichie (maybe you want to read this when you're older; it tells the story of the Biafran war through its characters eyes)

In the Sea There Are Crocodiles by Fabio Geda (a young asylum-seeker's testament)

Orangeboy by Patrice Lawrence (London teenager, gritty, urban)

Astrophysics for People in a Hurry by Neil Degrasse Tyson (discusses pressing concepts and questions about the universe)

Norse Mythology by Neil Gaiman (modern retellings of classic Norse myths)

The Great Gatsby by F Scott Fitzgerald (glitz, glamour and tragedy)
