3rd Place – Peter 8B (Singer)


2nd Place – Roko 9W (Drummer)

At Christmas the boys raised - £600 for Save the Children and Shelter and at half term - £460 for Mosaic LGBT Youth






Film Studies Students Visit Warner Brothers Studio Tour



On January 10th, 28 students from LaSWAP Film Studies, along with a group of students in Year 9 who had participated in the Film Project last summer, were taken to the magical Warner Brothers Studio Tour to learn about the filmmaking wizardry behind the *Harry Potter* film series.

Students were able to walk onto the famous sets, take choreography lessons and even experience the thrill of riding a broomstick over London with the help of some green-screen technology during the day. Ms Kay-Kreizman even got in on the action with some wand lessons with our sixth formers!



As well as being a hugely enjoyable trip, students also relished the opportunity to learn more about the craft of filmmaking and speak to industry professionals about their experiences working on the iconic film series. Roko in 9w said this about his experience on the day "The trip was very interesting for me, I learned to love *Harry Potter* and learnt a lot about filmmaking in general and I am grateful for the chance to have gone! What a magical day!"



#METOO

Deep Learning Day (DLD) in January involved the boys exploring a range of topics around the #METOO campaign. Year 7 had sessions on "Being a Gentleman", "Inspirational Women" and "Equality Activism"; Year 8 - "No more boys and girls"; Year 9 - "Masculinity" and Years 9, 10 and 11 - "Gender Equality and Sport" and "Everyday Sexism".

Mr Glover, who organised the sessions wrote at the end of the day:

I am incredibly proud of the response from the boys already and from the enthusiasm that was put into the day from staff. We created some powerful moments, moving discussions and, genuinely, changed some minds and attitudes about gender equality.

Performance Platform

In February, Mr Forbat, Head of Music hosted a termly Performance Platform in the hall. The event was supported by a good crowd of parents and staff. There were 23 boys performing with a highlight being ABBA's "Super Trouper", performed by Junior Brass. Congratulations to all the boys that took part, especially our new Year 7s – many were performing on their instrument for the first time.













Royal Albert Hall Concert

Throughout the term our musicians were practising regularly to take a leading role in the Camden bi-annual concert held at the Royal Albert Hall. We were especially pleased when Adam in Year 11 was chosen as a soloist and that the WES boys involved in the On Mass project were to perform. Mr Forbat, Head of Music was charged with being the lead on co-ordinating the musicians from all the Camden schools – with over 2,500 children taking part, and Mr Singleton, Music Teacher led the Secondary Choir.

Peter West, Head of Music Services, with his Deputy Deborah Rees and Primary Music Coordinator wrote to Mr Forbat and Mr Singleton:

Each student then created their own piece which went through around four different stages of rewrites before the boys were invited up to Lauderdale House to perform their work.

Taking the stage can be incredibly daunting, especially when performing something as personal as poetry, but all the boys performed with courage, confidently delivering their poems to the awestruck audience of invited guests.

Participant and performer Archie J in 9L had this to say 'I enjoyed this project due to the fact that it increased my poetry skills. It also helped develop my public speaking skills, making me a more confident speaker in front of a large crowd."

The boys were hugely grateful to Anthony and to Maddy Gilliam, Lauderdale House's Heritage Education Officer, for the lively and engaging discussions, the invaluable support during the workshop and development phases and the challenging experience of the public performance.
