### Information for students sitting public exams or assessments in 2022 and their families

This week the Department for Education have published further information about any adjustments to the content of exams for this summer. We fully expect these exams to go ahead in the summer and it is vital that students are organised and focused with their preparation and revision as we go into March.

#### Children's Mental Health Week

The theme of Children's Mental Health Week for 2022 is "Growing Together" - in particular, growing emotionally and finding ways to help each other grow. Challenges and setbacks can help us to grow and adapt and trying new things can help us to move beyond our comfort zone into a new realm of possibility and potential. However, emotional growth is often a gradual process that happens over time, and sometimes we might feel a bit 'stuck'.

At William Ellis, strategies that students can use to support their own mental health and also how they can help their peers are covered across the PSHE and tutorial curriculum, and students who are in most need can access one to one or small group support. However, the national organisation behind Children's Mental Health Week also provide resources to families that <u>can be found here</u> - please do take a look at them over the half term break If you think that this would be helpful.

### **Deep Learning Day 10<sup>th</sup> February 2022**

Led and devised by our Year 10 and 11 Student Council members with support from Mr Pratt, the theme of this week's DLD was "Is William Ellis a safe space?", encompassing discussions about mental health and emotional safety and LGBT+ inclusion. Several learning sessions for Year 7, 8 and 9 students were led by older students, providing opportunities for open and constructive discussions about how we work together as a school community. These days are a core part of our PHSE curriculum and are central to strengthening William Ellis as a community. Issues raised yesterday will be referenced and developed across the curriculum throughout the rest of the year and so it was particularly pleasing to see students taking this so seriously with their peers.

Key Stage Five students were also off timetable, learning about the various issues around sexual harassment. Year 12 students had a choice of activities, with some learning British Sign Language, and others learning about the social



and natural history of our area with a walk on Hampstead Heath. Yet others joined with the Year 13 students who watched a very thought-provoking play about modern relationships, called "Penetration".

#### **Charity fundraising**

December's Non-Uniform Day raised close to £330 for the Depaul charity which works with homeless and vulnerable young people <a href="www.depauluk.org">www.depauluk.org</a>. This organisation has seen a rise in young people accessing their services following family breakdown during the lockdowns of the last two years and so the donations from all students who contributed have been very gratefully received.

### Half Term Activities for young people in Camden

There's plenty for children and young people of all ages to get involved in and enjoy across Camden during half-term week. #### Coming up

After half term a number of Year 9 students will be taking part in poetry workshops with published poet Antony Anaxagorou, which will culminate in a performance at Lauderdale House in March.

In March Drama students will have an opportunity to see a theatrical production at a West End theatre and take part in a Q&A with cast and crew members. GCSE Drama students are invited to see the critically acclaimed musical *Hamilton*, while a number of Key Stage 3 students will see the stage version of *Life of Pi*, based on the Booker Prize winning novel.

Year 10 Parents' Evening will take place on 10th March. The following week, on 17<sup>th</sup> March, Year 12 Parents' Evening will take place. Further details of both these events will be sent to families after half term.

All Year 8 pupils designed and made a roller coaster during a 2 hour STEM event run by intrepid engineering undergraduate volunteers from UCL last month. The boys (and volunteers) seemed to enjoy the workshop and the pupils made impressive structures that demonstrated the scientific principles that had been explained to them at the start of the session. Well done Year 8!



### Lorna Damms, Head of English:

Year 7 students have been studying poems that specifically address works of art in their Ekphrastic Poetry unit. One class taught by Ms Damms and Ms Farrell painted pictures inspired by W.H. Auden's 'Musée des Beaux Arts' where the poem's speaker reflects on a painting of the story of Daedalus and Icarus in a Belgian museum. Each of our students painted, in turn, a picture inspired by that poem and we have displayed them, along with their captions. We might be willing to auction the original student artwork if any fine art collectors happen to be reading this.













For the students' final task, each was asked to select an artwork or exhibition piece and write a poem about it, and then a short analysis.

Here are two lovely poems from the class, firstly Niyaz's poem inspired by one of the Lewis chessmen pieces in the British Museum (and evidently by his history lessons with Ms Strike) whose voice he imagines to be that of the king in the game, a piece only allowed one move, and then Malik's poem which addresses a 1927 Chanel coat kept in the Metropolitan Museum of Art.

I am just a pawn with royalty nothing.


My crown is too tight And what's in my hand?

### **David Dreeben, City Year**


Earlier this month, the National Art Gallery Project (a partnership with William Ellis School and City Year UK) was launched with its first student trip, taking a group of 9 students from Key Stage 3 to the National Gallery for a workshop with a resident artist. Students explored several wings of the gallery, engaging in deep analysis of select works of art and experimenting with sketching, tracing, and 3D set construction; all activities connected back to this year's theme of Community.


The project will include weekly after-school art sessions from 3.20 to 4.20pm each Thursday (except field trip days) and another workshop trip to the gallery on March 3rd. The project's culmination will take place at final student trip on March 31<sup>st</sup> when students will have the opportunity display the community-themed art they create for the project in the National Gallery itself.

On Thursday this week Year 12 Cambridge Technical students took part in a workshop run remotely by the Design Museum. This is a fantastic institution in London that deals with all kind of objects and explores how and why they are designed in the way they are. The workshop was linked to the museum's current exhibition 'Waste Age'.



Students looked at historical objects, such a stone spear heads and tools, and then looked at a handling collection of objects - some which are very wasteful and some which use new designs and materials which allow then to be reused instead of going to landfill. In the second part of the workshop the students tried to redesign some wasteful objects - they were very creative and designed a toy minion made from wool, and a chair made of sticks!
