



News Update (1st April 2022)

Dear families,

Welcome to this edition of our newsletter to mark the end of the Spring Term, with submissions from the Art, Drama, Maths, Languages and Geography Departments. I would like to thank all of our staff, families, students and wider community for everything they have contributed to the life of the school this term.

Examinations and assessments

Based on the latest government guidance, we are fully expecting all public exams to go ahead as planned. All students must attend public exams according to the timetables they have been given – it is not possible to alter this schedule in any way, including for illness or absence. This is a return to how exams operated in 2019 and before. I appreciate that students currently in years 11 and 13 are under significant exam pressure but these regulations are set by the government. All students must attend the exams written on their timetable.

There is a study support and revision programme for examination students and this has been sent out to families and shared with Year 11 on the Study Hub. Teacher interventions will continue at the start of next term and students will be expected to continue to attend lessons until their exams start. They should also be completing independent revision outside their lessons – 10-15 hours per week for Year 11 students, and 5 hours per week for each subject they are studying in Year 13.

For families and young people who are finding themselves under pressure during exam time, there are some excellent resources at <u>YoungMinds</u> | <u>Mental Health Charity For Children And Young People</u> | <u>YoungMinds</u> Students should also seek support from their tutor in the first instance if there is something the school can do to help.

Outdoor Education curriculum

An important part of being a William Ellis student is learning in the outdoors through our camp programme (Key Stage 3) and Duke of Edinburgh Award Scheme (Key Stage 4 and 5). Through these activities, students learn increased levels of independence, self-management, emotional awareness and regulation, how to work well with their peers in teams and how to manage risks. All of these aspects of learning are critical to their development into happy, healthy and successful young adults.

A small group of Year 8 students went to The Mill for a nurture camp last week, and there is a student-authored report below. All other Key Stage 3 students will be attending camp at The Mill on the following dates:

Year 7 nurture camp (invite only): 4th-6th May Year 7 cohort camp: 27th June – 8th July Year 9 cohort camp: 6th-10th June The Year 8 cohort attended camp earlier in the year, and will have another chance to attend in Year 9

Families have been sent details of information that we need for these camps and how to make a financial contribution. I should stress that we expect all our students to attend – if there is an issue that you would like to discuss about camp attendance please contact the student's tutor in the first instance. 






Year 8 have now finished their project '*Text in Art*' and made these fantastic final artworks using a combination of different materials. Well done year eight!

place as Jack grows and develops his awareness and coordination in-front of our eyes. Learning through observation and thinking about what might be going on helps the students to identify their own emotions and to build empathy for how others are feeling.

I would like to start by saying congratulations to our talented mathematicians in Years 9, 10 and 11, who have competed successfully this year in the UKMT Intermediate Mathematics Challenge. This is the biggest national Maths competition, designed to broaden learning from the maths classroom through intriguing and demanding solving questions. It has over 700,000 entries each year and is one of the most popular school Maths Challenges.



This year, a total of 35 students, which is over a third of participants, have been awarded with a certificate from UKMT, with 8 gold, 12 silver and 15 bronze. It has been by far the best set of results that our WES students have achieved so far in the UKMT Maths challenges! Well done, boys!
