



News Update (27th May 2022)

Dear families,

Welcome to this edition of our newsletter as we break up for half term. I have some important updates about arrangements for when we return to school and for later in June and July.

Term dates

Staff and students return to school on **Monday 6th June** and our final day of term is **Thursday 21st July.**

Arrangements for the timetable after half term

When students return to school on Monday 6th June they will continue with their normal timetable, although almost all Year 9 students will be at The Mill for their camp week. Any students not attending Year 9 camp must come to school as normal. The first week back will be a Week A.

On Monday 13th June, Year 9 students will start their GCSE courses for their option subjects and so will have some changes to their timetable – they will each be given their updated version individually. Year 9 students will also follow the Key Stage 4 times of the school day, with break after period 2 (10:50am) and lunch after period 4 (1:10pm).

Students in other year groups will have very similar timetables to the ones they have now. If there are minor changes to accommodate GCSE teaching for Year 9, these will be communicated to them by Friday 10th June.

Key dates for this half term can be found <u>here on our website</u>. This includes dates for other Key Stage 3 camps, assessment weeks and Year 10 work experience.

Uniform

Students must continue to wear the <u>school uniform as listed here</u>. Year 9 students who need to have a new blazer can now wear a black Key Stage 4 one – those whose blazers still fit can wear a blue one up to the end of the summer term. Students should continue to wear their blazers and ties to school for the moment – if we have a period of exceptionally hot weather and need to change this we will let you know.

In particular, students must not wear hoodies or jumpers that are not part of the school uniform. If they arrive to school wearing these they will be asked to put them away for the day, and students who persistently wear them at break and lunch may have these items confiscated. Students must also continue to wear correct school PE kit for those lessons.

We have had some students bring small water pistols into school during the hot weather. These are not allowed in school at all and any student who is seen with one or uses one will have it confiscated and may face a further sanction.



Attendance

It is critical that all students continue to attend school every day on time after so much disruption in the past few years. We have had an increase in families requesting special leave for holidays in term time. Unless there is a highly exceptional welfare reason, permission will not be granted. This is in line with the policy in all other Camden schools.

Students with 100% attendance next half term will be entered into a competition to win Sainsbury's and Amazon vouchers, provided with the support of Camden Council.

Finally, thank you for your input and support during our Ofsted inspection last week. We have not received any written report yet and this will not happen before mid-July at the earliest. Once it is published it will be available on our website.

Year 8 T&L class trip to Greenwich

After a long period of disruptions, we had the opportunity to take learning outside the classroom again and add to the students' experience of their city. The class were enthralled by the rich collection of artefacts and exhibits in the galleries of the National Maritime museum in Greenwich; hundreds of incredible objects told the stories of exploration and endeavour that have shaped our world today. Students gathered interesting information about the race for Atlantic empires and learned how raw materials like sugar, coffee, cotton and tobacco turned into very desirable resources. The multi-sensory interactions in the *Atlantic Worlds* and the *Traders* galleries helped us understand how people's life was impacted by discoveries. A walk to the Royal Observatory in Greenwich park to see the Prime Meridian and to marvel at the amazing views of the river Thames and the City made the trip a truly memorable experience. The day out concluded with a treat at the Greenwich market.



This is what some students said about their trip:

Zakariya: 'My favourite part of the trip was the *Ship Simulator* which felt like you are actually navigating the ship. We were presented with a situation and a problem and we had to use the information on the board and the four screens to decide where to steer the ship. I had to use my geographical knowledge of latitude and longitude to understand the data appearing on the board. The trip was so fun I would do it again. We found interesting facts about how people traded since 1600s. From the hill where the London Observatory is, we got to see beautiful views of London.'





Samuel: 'I enjoyed the trip as we got to learn about the slave trade, how slaves were treated on the ships and in the plantations. I also saw the spices that East India Company traded like pepper, cloves, cinnamon and nutmeg.' Bobby: 'The trip we went on, Miss showed us a lot of Greenwich and we got breath-taking views from the top in Greenwich park. We also bought stuff for our families in the museum shop and spent some time on the Great Map in the middle of the museum. I had a great time in the museum. We were meant to play football in the park but the weather was terrible, however we still had a lovely time together.'
