Drama Lighting Workshop Anna Hughes, Head of Drama

On Friday 17th March, both GCSE Drama classes took part in a lighting workshop. Industry expert Jon Cole showed students examples of different types of theatre lighting and other accessories such as gels and gobos. Then students used these items to experiment with different angles, colours and effects to understand the importance of lighting in creating atmosphere, allowing the audience to see what we want them to, and to emphasise important characters and props on stage.



Wings of Hope Speed Mentoring Event Horace Parry, Head of Year 11 & Careers Lead

The Wings of Hope organisation (WOHAA) are hosting a very special event, where students aged 13-18 years old get the opportunity to speak to young successful professionals from various industries, about their career paths.

It is open to current WOHAA Participants, WOHAA Alumni, as well as NON WOHAA Participants (for a fee).

WOHAA have provided some further detail here:

- Approximately 20 different industries will be represented
- Students can have 1 to 1 chat with young professionals and meet other students in similar positions
- Informal setting to ask any questions they want about Uni choices, gap year, and career paths
- Current WOHAA participants attend FREE. Non WOHAA participants can attend by paying a small fee of £10.00 per student.

Students get 15 minutes per industry table to find out more from the mentor, by having an honest conversation with them. Students can cover approx. 8 industry tables during this session.
