First off (and highly popular) was 'Stage Combat' where pushes, slaps and punches were delivered with minimum contact and maximum illusory effect. The boys were disciplined and powerful.

This was followed by 'Comedy Improv' where the focus was creating comedy together by adding and building high-energy and very expressive physical skills which helped make this a great success.

The third in the series was a mock-up of life for an actor and director in front of the camera on a Film/TV set. By now the boys were experts at collaborative creativity and the work was swift, smart and used some of the previous workshop skills beautifully.

As I write they will head into their final workshop on 'SFX Stage Make-Up' where I'm sure the results will be bloody and terrifying! A great set of practitioners from Go Live Theatre Projects combined with a fantastically talented group of Year 9 boys to make this a special experience.


### Year 13 Spanish trip to Andalucía Joely Pritchett, MFL Teacher

### Year 9 Othello Workshop Lorna Damms, Head of English

On October 2<sup>nd</sup>, 40 Year 9 students had the fantastic opportunity to work with a team from UCL Institute of Education in a morning workshop on the Shakespeare play 'Othello'. This play is on the curriculum in the spring of Year 9 and the two-hour workshop served as an introduction to its themes as well as to collaborative approaches to reading and exploring the text. The workshop was led by Dr John Yandell who brought a dozen PGCE student teachers with him to work with some of our lovely Year 9s. We were all so impressed by the Year 9s' inventiveness, their insight and by how far their performance work progressed in the space of the morning.

We were lucky, too, to have some of the students' work filmed by two talented Year 13 film studies students, Taner and Ophelia from Ms Kreizman's class. This means we will be able to show all the Year 9s what was done in the workshop and it will be an introduction to the text that can then be built upon in the spring.

We know the students enjoyed the morning and found themselves doing impressive interpretations of fragments of the play. John Yandell commented that "They entered into the activities with energy, enthusiasm and imagination – and they can be proud of what they produced."
